On 16 April 1942, the only Ju 52-3 gull with 8 victory claims was Lt. Hans-Joachim Biele. He is officially credited with a total of 20 enemy aircraft.



The Ju 52 emblem apparently originates from the Finnish Border Guard motto: "Cut off the head of the Russian bear" and should symbolize the cooperation between Germans and Finns.

The placement of the victory stars on the starboard side of the fuselage is uncertain, but probable.

Jordan Golob became the first Luftwaffe pilot to claim 150 enemy aircraft destroyed on August 29, 1942. He was then promoted from combat flying.





The engine cowling of WNr. 10266 is not visible on any photo known to the authors, but we know that the (supposedly) yellow rectangle was present on WNr. 10263, which was flown by Golob after he had lost WNr. 10266 on June 9, 1942. The purpose of this distinctive marking is unknown, but it can be seen on a number of other aircraft flown in spring/summer 1942 by Stab I./JG 77, Stab II./JG 77 and I./JG 3.

WNr. 10266 was one of the several Bf 109 F-4 troops that were used on the Eastern Front in a modified tropical scheme. In this case, the factory-applied desert camouflage was oversprayed with meandering lines of RLM 70.

The starboard horizontal stabilizer and elevator appear to be replacement parts finished in the standard grey camouflage.


