To our Fellow Modelers:-



We invite your comments and wish you the best of modeling fortune.

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
Unit: 334th Fighter Squadron, 4th Fighter Group, U.S. 8th Air Force.
Base: Debden, England.
Time: early May, 1944.
Pilot: Ralph K. "Kid" Hofer.

On April 5th Hofer loaned his plane to another pilot. It was shot down near Potsdam. The same thing happened on the 29th. Hofer's new plane, the one he would fly to fame, is the subject of the decal sheet. In this aircraft he ran his string of 11% victories (early May) up to 30% before he was shot down over Hungary while on a Russia-Italy shuttle raid July 2, 1944. The exact circumstances of Hofer's death remained a mystery for many years after the war but it now appears that he fell to the guns of Erich Hartmann, of I/1052, Germany's greatest ace with 340 victories. Hofer was actually flying another machine, coded QP-X, when shot down.

Color Scheme and Markings:

Overall: Bare Metal.
Anti-glare Panel: Olive Drab 41.
Propeller: blades - black with 4" Identification Yellow tips.
spinner (and nose) - Red (as shown).
Identification Bands: Black (not a decal), as per Gentile.
Interior: Zinc Chromate.

On June 5, 1944 the aircraft was painted with "invasion stripes." The black I.D. bands were retained. Hofer had his full 30% victories at the time.


NORTH AMERICAN P-51B-5-NA (43-6913) "Shangri-La"

Unit: 336th Fighter Squadron, 4th Fighter Group, U.S. 8th Air Force.
Base: Debden, England (see map).
Time: March 1944
Pilot: Captain Don Salvadore "Gentle" Gentile

The subject of the decal sheet is the same aircraft that Gentile flew in early April when he became the first American pilot of World War 2 to surpass Capt. Eddie Rickenbacker's WWI record of 26 victories. Gentile ultimately gained 30 victories and was once called a "one man air force" by General Eisenhower. Gentile became a national hero but unfortunately this aircraft, which had carried him to such success, was "pranged" (crashed and destroyed) while Don was stunting for the newsreel cameras during mid-April.

Color Scheme and Markings:

Upper Surfaces: Olive Drab 41.
Under Surfaces: Neutral Grey 43.
These colors were blended into eachother by overspraying along a line approximating that shown on the drawing.
Interior of cockpit and wheelwells: Zinc Chromate.
Propeller: blades - black with 4" (prototype) Identification
Yellow 48 tips.
Spinner - rear 1/3 (as shown) Bright Red.
forward 2/3 white.
Red band ahead of exhausts (as shown). This was the identification marking of the 4th FG.
White 12" (prototype) identification bands on wings and stabilizer, (as shown).



NORTH AMERICAN P-51B- -NA (43-6374) "Ding Hao!"


Unit: 356th Fighter Squadron, 354th Fighter Group, U.S. 9th

Air Force.
Base: Colchester, England (see map)
Time: January, 1944.
Pilot: Major James H. Howard

The 354th Fighter Group was the first unit in the E.T.O. to be equipped with the P-51B, beginning operations on the type in December, 1943. One of the pilots in this group was Major James Howard, who was already an ace from his service in the American Volunteer Group (the "Flying Tigers") over China. On January 11, 1944 Major Howard single-handedly routed a formation of 30 Bf-110's that were attacking a group of B-17's over Germany. Howard shot down three of the attackers, damaging three more, and for this action received the Congressional Medal of Honor.

Color Scheme and Markings:

Same as Gentile's "Shangri-La" except;

For the bare metal finish on Hofer's aircraft we recommend "Rub-n-Buff", a silvering paste available at many hobby shops and craft stores. For best results it should be applied over a base of Flat White (Pactra or Flo-Quil). It is difficult to mask on "Rub-n-Buff" so I.D. bands, anti-glare panels, etc., should be painted first and masked off.
