Early Neshers were delivered with Martin Baker Mk.4 seats. After the Yom Kippur War during the mid 1970's, this seat were replaced by the MB Mk.6. The latter was retained even by the FAA when the Neshers were converted to Dagger and later to Finger standards.

NOTE: Some Mk.4 seats were retrofitted with dual handles on top, so check your reference carefully!



Paint cockpit tub, sidewalls and instrument panels **H 8** Black, including the bulkhead behind the seat's headrest and avionic housings.

Paint the metal frame of the Mk.4/6 ejection seat H® Black with parachute housing under the head rest in HU 163. Remaining cushions were HU 159 Khaki Drab. Shoulder and side belts in HU 81 Brownish Yellow. Middle main belt in HU 66 Olive Drab. Other colours in use are Red, Yellow, White, Black and Aluminium.


























We provide two highly detailed 1,300 litre - auxiliary wing tanks, relevant to that period of time and often carried during the 1970s and 1980s.



As main armament two highly detailed 'RAFAEL Shafrir 2' air-to-air missiles with rails are included in our kit.

These missiles were used with great success by the Israeli AF during the Yom Kippur War in 1973 and were also operated by the Argentinian Air Force, which had bought surplus 'Nesher' aircraft and operated those under the designation 'Dagger' during the 1980s.







The Neshers entered service with the IAF in mid October 1971, first with 101 squadron. In early 1973, the Hornet squadron started receiving the Nesher and prepared to retire the veteran Ouragans. All the Neshers were painted similar to the Mirages that were in service. The existence of the Neshers were kept secret that time due the French embargo and the fact that the aircraft were assembled in Israel.






FAA Dagger / Finger / Mara Colours and Markings:

Dagger

IAI Daggers were delivered from Israel in a SEA-like camouflage scheme, but using distinctive RAL colours. Thes were RAL 1019 Graubeige, RAL 6003 Olivgrün, RAL 6015 Schwarz Olive and RAL 7047 Telegrau 4 – all with a satin finish. Equivalents were the usual Federal Standard paints FS 36622 Camouflage Grey, FS 30219 Dark Tan, FS 34102 Medium Green and FS 34079 Dark Green. Several aircraft sported the delivery colour for a number of years. After overhaul or repairs, they were repainted with matt paint, which faded and chipped considerably.

During the Malvinas (Falklands) conflict, ID-bands were applied in a shade that resembles Insignia Yellow. The bottom parts of the auxiliary wing tanks were usually painted in a darker shade of yellow, similar to Mr. Hobby H58 Orange Yellow. Turquoise was painted over the yellow after the latter was found ineffective.

Mara

Mirage 5P aircraft, later re-designated Mara, were supplied by Peru to Argentina in their original sand-brown scheme, which was later repainted using more unique tan and light green colours. For the 'sand or light tan' colour you could use either HU 93 Desert Yellow or HU 118 Tan. The green, however, has been subject of much speculation as paints were mixed in a non-standard manner – several variations are known to have existed. Try Humbrol paints HU 76 or Hu 78 as light olive is a close match. You can mix according to your own taste as sometimes the light green had a blue hue. Under surfaces were painted in light grey – we suggest to use Humbrol 147 or better even, Testors 1233 Light Aircraft Grey.

Finger


Both Fingers and Maras alongside the surviving Mirage IIIEA aircraft adopted a single-tone light grey scheme, sometimes dubbed "anonymous" as the only way to determine their identity is to look inside the main landing gear bay door and check the two-digit aircraft code. Again, shades could vary considerably as earlier Mirages were of a darker shade (similar to FS 36375) and later adopted a close match to FS36495 which equals Humbrol HU 147 or Testors 1711.
