The North American F-86A was a single-engined jet fighter built at Inglewood, California for the United States Air Force. It was the first American swept-wing fighter to see service, developed from the XP-86 prototype variant. But though the XP-86 (which first flew in October 1947) was powered by the J35 engine with a thrust of 1815 kg, North American Aviation managed to incorporate the 2200 kg thrust J47 powerplant into the F-86A, which flew just seven months after the prototype. The F-86A was capable of breaking the sound barrier in a steep dive.

The first active-duty F-86As entered service with the 1st Fighter Group at March AFB in California during February 1949. A second unit, the 4th Fighter Group at Langley AFB in Virginia, commenced operating the F-86A in June 1949 and ultimately six full Fighter Groups with a nominal strength of 75 aircraft each operated the F-86A. Four other independent USAF squadrons and a training wing also operated the type; early in 1949 the F-86 was named "Sabre".
