On 19 August 1942, F/O lbbotson would claim a Fw 190 as probably destroyed in this aircraft. Please note that the extreme lower portion of the nose art torso is provisional. Aircraft fitted with short carb air intake and large upper wing cannon blisters.

Colors: Lower surfaces; Medium Sea Grey. Uppersurfaces; Dark Green and Ocean Grey.

Spinner and rear fuselage band; Sky type "S". Wing leading edges; Yellow

June 1944

S/L Wally McLeod DSO, DFC and Bar was the top scoring RCAF fighter in the air on D-day. He died in combat near Nijmegan on 27 September 1944. He was credited with 21 victories. Aircraft fitted with "E" type wing with narrow cannon blisters in outboard position and extended carb air intake.

Colors: Lower surfaces; Medium Sea Grey. Uppersurfaces; Dark Green and Ocean Grey.

Spinner and rear fuselage band; Sky type "S". Wing leading edges; Yellow.

Invasion Stripes; Full wrap around regulation Black and White being applied 18" forward of the horizontal surfaces. The fuselage code "E" on the left and "I" on the right of the aircraf likely outlined in black when the stripes were

applied to assist in recognition.

145 Sqn RAF

Spring 1943

This aircraft was one of ten Spitfires assigned to The Polish Fighting Team (PFT) or "Skalskis Circus". A group of fifteen Poles were assigned as part of "C" Flight of 145 Sqn. This group of pilots would operate for only a short period of time and they would claim from March 28th 1943 to May 6th 1943 a total of 25 confirmed, 3 probable and 9 damaged planes. So skilled was this group that when they were disbanded three members were assigned to the RAF as Squadron Leaders. Aircraft fitted with short carb air intake and large upper wing cannon blisters.

Colors: Lower surfaces; Field applied Azure Blue. Uppersurfaces; Field applied Dark Earth and Middle Stone. Spinner; Red.

PFT used Blue fuselage codes to distinguish themselves from other aircraft of 145 Sqn.
