

# **Curtiss Condor**

## 1/81 scale

The Curtiss-Wright Model 32 Condor was the last American biplane airliner. The original Condor airliner was a direct development of the Curtiss B-2 Condor bomber of the early 1930's. The new Model 32 was a completely different design. Forty-five of the aircraft were produced in five versions, one type carrying up to 15 passengers. The first machine flew on January 30, 1933, and was delivered to Eastern Air Lines. Aircraft No. 2 went to American Airways four months later.

The Condor proved quite able and clearly had a good future, but it had the misfortune of arriving on the scene at almost the same time as the revolutionary Douglas DC-1. Production of the Condor ended in October, 1934, but the type was assured a place in history due to the service rendered during Admiral Richard E. Byrd's historic trip to Antarctica during 1933-35.

Several of the planes were operated by Chinese, Peruvian, Colombian and Argentinian military services. At least one of the planes remained in service into the 1950's.








## History of Swissair and International Air Freight Curtiss Condors

## **Swissair Curtiss Condor**

Apart from the ten improved AT-32 models of Condors produced by Curtiss for American Airways, the only other civil AT-32 (c/n 53) was for Swissair (CH-170). This was delivered in late March of 1934. It went into service on the Zurich-Berlin route and came to a tragic ending when it crashed killing all on board. It was the first airliner in Europe to have a stewardess.

For many years the markings for the Swissair were thought to have a red fuselage with silver wings and a blue circle containing the SwissCH. However, after further investigation, it turns out to have been a blue fuselage rather than red and with a red circle containing the CH.



## International Air Freight, Ltd.

In 1937, four ex-Eastern Air Transport Curtiss T-32 Condors were purchased by a British company, International Air Freight Ltd. out of Croydon (c/ns 28, 29, 30, and 36). There was not a great demand for this kind of business and I. A. F. went into liquidation in September of 1938.

The four aircraft were taken over by the Air Ministry to be used as navigational trainers but were never used and later scrapped.



## Are there any Curtiss Condors still in existence?

There are no existing Curtiss Condors. However, there is a group of people in the United States that has been rescuing pieces of Condors from all over North America and plan to rebuild a flyable example. That will be very exciting.
