




### Hellenic Air Force F-86D Sabre Dogs







#### **DECALS APPLICATION INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. After painting, give your model a coat or two of your favourite gloss varnish and allow drying. Decals adhere better on glossy than on matte surfaces.
- 2. Cut one decal at a time. Start with the large ones (e.g. insignia) first, then move on to smaller, such as stencil data.
- 3. Dip the decal in lukewarm water for 15 seconds. Set it aside for approximately one minute, until it can easily slide on backing paper. Do not force decal to move before adhesive has dissolved, or you might tear the decal film.
- **4.** Slide decal on model surface. To move it slightly, use a clean, wet brush. Setting solutions will help, but some might be too strong for some decals. Practice first on a decal you are not going to use.
- 5. When finished, let the decals dry for approximately 24 hours. Then, you may inspect them again for air bubbles or silvering. In this case, score the affected area with the tip of a hobby knife, apply a drop of setting solution and allow drying again overnight. When everything is in order, wash off the model with water to remove excessive decal glue.
- 6. Finally, apply some coats of varnish to seal the decals and give your model the desired finish.
- 7. A clear, well lighted area will ease your job. Be patient, take your time when working, and you will be rewarded with better models.

#### **BRIEF HISTORY**

The Hellenic Air Force (HAF) received 35 ÍNorth American F-86Ds from USAF. They were used aircraft previously serving with USAFE units in Great Britain and Germany. Deliveries started on 17 May 1960. The aircraft were used by the 337 and 343 All Weather Interception Squadrons. The 337 Sqn used them until 1967, while the 343 Squadron until 1965. In both Squadrons they were to be replaced by F-5A/Bs. The F-86Ds were natural metal with undersurfaces in what appears to most likely be ADC Grey. There was one exception, aircraft 210067, a former 514FIS aircraft of 86FIW, stationed at Rammstein, Germany. She was possibly overall natural metal, although she might also have grey undersurfaces (it is unclear from the photos) and she retained her ex-USAFE tail markings and Squadron emblem, as well as her finish throughout her service with the HAF. After the Cyprus crisis in 1964 aircraft were painted in the "NATO" camouflage scheme. This seems to have been done in great haste and without a particular pattern, and there were major differences from one aircraft to another. Today, only two aircraft survive in static display at Museums, while another four or five are abandoned in various HAF units.
